Harbury School and Surgery are close to capacity, they have already had to cope with 40 plus new houses due to new housing developments in the last 12 months.

It is within the Environment Agency's Flood Zone and Harbury Lane floods badly. Any more development removing natural land for drainage will only exacerbate the problem

Safe access to the road network and provision for parking, turning and servicing on site;

My husband cycles to work and crosses the Fosse Way at its junction with Middle Road, to use the footpath joining on to Golf Lane in Whitnash and has to wait 10 to 15 minutes before it is safe to cross. Travellers with trailers would have a problem turning on to the Fosse Way and it would be very dangerous in particular during peak periods.
